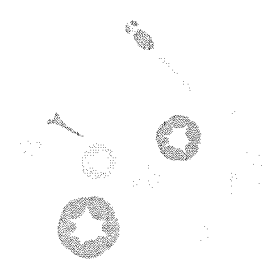

Last week a student experienced a severe allergic reaction to peanuts or a product containing peanut oils. We have been aware of this student's allergy and have taken steps to make CPS safe. The steps currently in place are not far reaching enough. I cannot over state how severe the allergic reaction was.

Going forward, we are in the process of putting together a procedure that will make CPS a safer place for this student. Changes will have to be made school-wide which will effect all students. When complete, all families will receive a copy.

Until this procedure can be fully developed we ask ALL CPS families to begin looking at the peanut products you send with your child and voluntarily limit the products with peanuts and peanut oils.

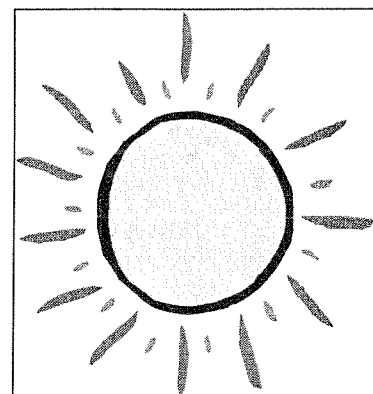
Please help all of us in making CPS a safe environment for all students to thrive in.

It will be hard to see them go. It has been a very busy past couple of weeks for us. The kids are doing a great job dealing with the heat, busy schedules and later nights. 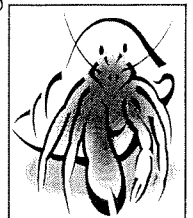

He is submerged in water at the moment trying to grow. When we first got him, we measured his length in inches and discovered that he was  $3\frac{1}{2}$  inches long. Each day we will be taking him out of his tank and measuring his growth.

Our other class pet is an actual living pet. We now have a Beta fish named Blueberry in honor of our ocean unit. Hopefully, Mrs. Merrill and our class will take good care of him. While learning about the ocean and its many creatures, we have created several different projects. The kids have made beautiful fish with creative artwork, dot-a-dot art and "Buddy Fish" with our Middle School buddies. All of which are on display in the hall. This week we are working to complete an ocean mobile, a puffer fish and a seahorse ocean scene. We have learned many different facts about ocean creatures such as the male seahorse is the one to carry the babies, and that when a crab changes its shell - it sheds the one it has grown out of, drinks lots of water to puff way up and then grows a hard shell to fit its puffed up body. Pretty cool stuff! We have also learned that we live on the Atlantic Ocean. We are hoping for great weather next week for our trip. Dear Families, It is hard to believe that the end-of-the-school-year is approaching. Although time is winding down, things in Kindergarten are "winding up!" We have had a very busy month of May and our last few weeks in June are

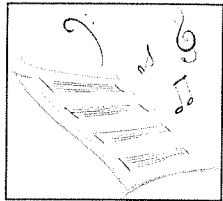
jam-packed with activities and assessments. The students completed a science unit on weather this month and had great fun conducting experiments like professional scientists! We explored properties of water, the water cycle, and clouds. We are currently in the middle of our ocean unit as we will be heading to the Maine coast next week. Through art projects, reading a wide variety of non-fiction, and video clips, children have learned about many ocean creatures and life under the sea. Ask your child how many teeth an average shark has or when the first sharks lived on earth! Our class is also enjoying observing and learning about our new class pets. We created a habitat or "crabitat" for our two hermit crabs, which the children voted to name "Crabby" and "Patty." We are incorporating math and social studies into our ocean unit by graphing favorite ocean creatures, solving story problems about fish, and learning how the sea provides many different types of jobs, such as biologists, fishermen, seafood sales, etc. During writing workshop we have been creating concept books. These young writers know what their cover and cover pages need and that each page needs an illustration and words. Ask your child what is on their verso page, too, (dedication, publication info, and what medium the illustration were made in). Last week we took a walk to Mahoosuc Montessori to read our books to the preschool children there. Our students were so very proud of themselves and felt so accomplished reading to our little friends! Great job! When I look back at where each child was



academically and socially when they began kindergarten in the fall, it is wonderful to see the amazing and almost magical progress they have made! Thank you for sharing your children with me and for all of your support this year. Enjoy your summer with your little ones!

## FIRST GRADE

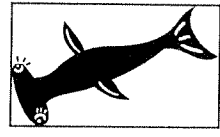
### Mrs. Charette

We finished our fractions unit, and have taken the test on it. (Our final unit of study in Math this year focuses on various forms of measurement.) Next, we took another timed math facts test. We took another spelling test, too. We also did the final writing prompt this week. Because it concerns itself with the ocean, it seemed to make sense to have the children complete this activity shortly after our return from the aquarium. The homework handed out on Monday was the final packet of **planned** homework for this school year, though children who are not able to complete their daily seatwork may still be given worksheets to complete at home that night and return to school the next day. We are done sight words for the year now, and the children will be assessed on the reading and writing of these words when we return after our Memorial Day holiday. The dates and times of the NWEA testing these children will take have not been scheduled yet. When they

are, I will let you know. Finally, I would like to express my sincere gratitude to the volunteers who have helped out our classroom this year. It doesn't matter if your help took the form of working in the classroom to help children repair their work, or if you were one of our terrific chaperones, or if you supplied foods for our parties. I appreciate every way in which you have contributed to making this a successful year for every member of this class. Every way in which you contributed took that particular task "off my plate" and allowed me to do that much more for the children in this room. **I could not have done it without so much help from YOU! ### **Mrs. Meader**

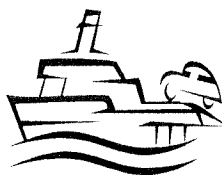

### Mrs. Conrad

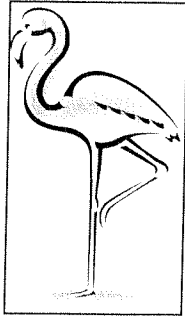

## Art

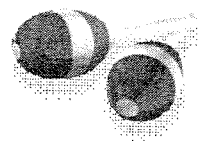

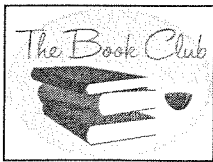
Concerts are over, and everyone did a fabulous job! The next thing on the agenda is a band and chorus tour for the
